After a heavy Midwest thunderstorm, it is not uncommon to see "lakes" forming in backyards or, worse, water seeping into basements.

Understanding the geology of **Bondurant**, **IA** is the first step toward solving these issues. Unlike sandy soils that let water pass right through, clay particles pack together tightly, creating an impermeable barrier. When the ground is saturated, the water has nowhere to go but sideways—often right toward your home.

The Dangers of Negative Grade

The ground surrounding your home should always slope away from the foundation. This is known as "positive grade." However, over time, the backfill soil around a house settles. This is especially common in the rapid-growth neighborhoods of **Bondurant**, **IA**. This settling creates a "negative grade," acting like a funnel that directs roof runoff and rainwater directly against your basement walls.

The resulting hydrostatic pressure can crack foundations and lead to costly flooding repairs. A professional landscape team can correct this by bringing in fill dirt to re-grade the perimeter of the home, ensuring a slope that sheds water safely away.

Burying Downspouts: A Simple Fix

One of the most effective drainage upgrades you can make is burying your downspouts. Most homes have downspouts that dump water just a foot or two from the foundation. During a 1-inch rain event, a 2,000-square-foot roof sheds over 1,200 gallons of water. Dumping that volume right next to your house is a recipe for disaster.

We excavate trenches and install rigid PVC piping connected to your downspouts. We transport this water 20, 30, or even 50 feet away from the home, releasing it into a lower area of the yard or a storm drain via a "pop-up emitter." This keeps your foundation dry and prevents erosion in your flower beds.

French Drains for Swampy Yards

If you have a low spot in your yard that stays wet for days, killing your grass and breeding mosquitoes, you may need a French Drain. This system involves digging a trench, lining it with geotechnical fabric, and filling it with clean gravel and a perforated pipe. Water takes the path of least resistance, flowing into the gravel and pipe, which then shuttles it out of the yard. French drains are a staple solution for the flat, clay-heavy topography of **Bondurant**, **IA**.

Dry Creek Beds: Beauty Meets Function

Drainage solutions don't have to be ugly buried pipes. A "Dry Creek Bed" is a landscape feature designed to manage surface runoff. We use varying sizes of river rock and boulders to construct a channel that looks like a natural stream bed. When it rains, it acts as a high-capacity canal to move water across your property without washing away mulch or soil. When it is dry, it adds texture and visual interest to the landscape. It is a popular choice for **Bondurant**, **IA** homeowners who want to solve a problem while enhancing curb appeal.

Sump Pump Discharge Management

Almost every home in **Bondurant**, **IA** relies on a sump pump to keep the basement dry. But where does that pump discharge the water? If the hose is just laying on the lawn, it creates a mud pit and often recirculates the water right back down to the foundation drain tile. We can bury your sump pump line alongside your downspout lines, carrying that water far away from the house. We often install a "freeze guard" or air gap to ensure the pump can still operate even if the buried line freezes in winter.
